Getting Started

This guide will help identify treatment services for people whose substance use is negatively affecting their lives. The good news is that recovery from substance use is possible. It's never too late to explore resources and take a small step. This booklet is a good place to start searching for support and get connected as quickly as possible. However, it is not meant to substitute professional consultation, evaluation and treatment.

The providers in this guide will work with you to decide on the best course of treatment. If you are already engaged in treatment but are interested in exploring other services, start a conversation with your current provider, as they may be able to assist you.

Choosing a Treatment Provider

Private providers

are marked with a green dot. Private providers are people who deliver specific service(s) and are not part of an agency (e.g., a private counselor).

Providers who offer opioid treatment

are marked with a blue dot. These providers offer medication-assisted treatment (MAT), using a combination of medication and counseling, to help people move through withdrawal symptoms and manage cravings following opioid use.

Intensive Outpatient Programs (IOPs)

are marked with a black dot. IOPs are treatment programs sometimes recommended following clinical assessment for people who may require increased counseling support, but who may not be appropriate for residential/inpatient treatment.

Treatment of Heroin, Opioids and Prescription Pain Medication Use

If a person using opioids (heroin/fentanyl/or pills such as hydrocodone or oxycodone) has not been able to stop because of withdrawal symptoms, treatment services may be needed. Treatment services that include medications help manage cravings and avoid withdrawal. Methadone and buprenorphine (Suboxone) are medications that assist with starting recovery from opioid use by allowing the brain to stabilize. After this initial phase, naltrexone is another medication used to help avoid cravings and block the effect of opioids. Your doctor or substance use treatment provider can help you understand if medication-assisted treatment may be best for your needs, and help you find a local treatment provider.

If you are pregnant and are using heroin, other opioids, prescription pain medications, alcohol or other substances, contact your OB/GYN, substance use treatment provider, and/or primary care provider as soon as possible to identify the best type of care for both you and your developing baby.

School-Based Alcohol and Substance Use Services

Students at most high schools and middle schools can get free and confidential substance use and mental health services at their school. Common services include education; problem solving; alcohol, drug and mental health screening; brief counseling; referral to treatment services; and recovery support. Ask your school if it has a student assistance program or behavioral health provider.

Case Management Services

Many people living with substance use or who are in treatment may also face tremendous pressures such as housing instability, as well as medical, dental and emotional neglect. Nurses, counselors, case managers and practices are ready to help them address and resolve these issues. As you contact treatment providers, ask if there is a case manager that works with the practice. They can make a tremendous difference. They want to help you!

Not Ready for Treatment? Reduce Risk of Substance Use

Substance use disorder is a disease that can be treated. It is not a sign of poor character or bad judgment.

Not everyone who uses substances is ready to quit. Many persons use substances as a result of shame and feelings of unworthiness from being treated poorly by friends, family, community or others because of their substance use (this is called stigma).

The most important way to help someone who is negatively impacted by substance use is to meet them where they are, honor their humanity and show kindness. The first step to curbing substance use in our communities is to work to eliminate stigma.

These resources can go a long way to help people using substances. The important thing to note is that change takes time and may come in stages.

Stage 1: Save lives! Overdose death is a community crisis that can be prevented. Here are 3 ways to prevent overdose death:



It's easy to use and free at many local emergency departments and recovery centers.

Call (800) 484-3731 for support without judgment. A caring person will stay on the line, but also call for help if there is no response.

Call 911 During or After an Overdose

You're protected under the law as a Good Samaritan.

Area emergency departments and recovery centers give out Narcan for free. Also, area emergency room patients who are ready for change can receive an initial dose of treatment medication (like Suboxone) and get an immediate referral to an addiction specialty provider within a day.

Stage 2: Reduce risk! Use or overuse of opioid drugs comes with a higher risk of infection, disease or even death. In this region, the HIV/HCR Resource Center in Lebanon (serving the surrounding region) provides anonymous services like Narcan education and can give out Fentanyl test kits, clean needles and Narcan. Stage 3: Spread hope! Thousands of Vermonters have shared their stories and found hope in recovery by joining a peer recovery network and connecting with peer recovery coaches.
